It is with an enormous sense of pride that we announce our superb Matric results for 2018. Of the 86 girls who sat the IEB Matric examinations, 85 attained a Bachelor's Degree pass and one a Diploma pass.

Our Dux scholar, Nicola Ralston, has been placed on the IEB Merit list for Outstanding Achievement; this means that she is placed in the top 5% nationally across 6 subjects and has attained a Level 7 for Life Orientation. Caroline Shuter was placed in the top 1% nationally in three subjects: Geography, Life Sciences and Mathematics.

The results across the board are exceptional and the entire Matric class of 2018 is to be congratulated.

The following girls achieved a Full House of **Seven Distinctions:** Emma Brockwell; Caroline Cotton; Nicola Ralston; Avia Repapis and Caroline Shuter.

A further six girls attained six distinctions. They were: Kate Allanson; Caydn Barker; Sasha Domnick; Julia Kirkpatrick; Kelly-Anne Shaw and Teagan Thompson. Five girls attained five distinctions: Kate Mc Master; Carla Norris; Julia Parton; Kesia van der Merwe and Olivia Wright.
